"My clients are so 'extra'...

they wanted everything in their house to be yellow—the kitchen, the trim," Amber Lewis says of her friends turned clients and their vision for transforming a 19th-century former ship captain's home into "everybody's summer house" on Martha's Vineyard. "I was like, 'Nope! We'll get in color, but in a way that makes sense.'"

The owner of lifestyle brand Biscuit Home, Bailey McCarthy, and her husband, Pete, appreciated Lewis's perspective. They asked her to combine her relaxed-but-refined style with Bailey's over-the-top flair. (This is a woman who hosts a Pink Poodle Party starring her rose-tinted dog every year.) Lewis had sworn "never to work with friends" but made an exception for the McCarthys, in part because "the whole house was a jumbled mess."

Before she could debate the couple's color choices, she needed to bring order to the chaos. **"We figured if we could create one long space, like a hotel lobby, we could have more funky rooms off of it,"** Lewis explains. She began by opening up the living room to create distinct conversational areas around each of the existing fireplaces; one side is grounded by a velvet sofa, the other by an English-inspired corner banquette. In the expanded eat-in kitchen, she mixed New England touches such as painted cabinetry and checked linen seating with old-world elements like patinated copper and Calacatta marble.

With roomy gathering spaces taken care of, Lewis turned her attention to the "flair." A bookcase in the living room hides an island-inspired speakeasy, complete with bar seating that mimics seashells. Downstairs, a multilevel movie room is outfitted with wall-to-wall cashmere carpet and draped in 326 yards of fabric. And then there's the poolside outdoor tent, because "extra" was still on order. The cabana was cleverly fabricated in rust-proof metal and finished in a sunny stripe, giving McCarthy her desired in-your-face color (she really wanted green and yellow stripes, but Lewis nixed that). Proving that compromise is the key to any good partnership, their friendship is still intact. "We now know how we work," Lewis says. "We could totally do this again!" **•**
